was an active member of the Latin American Student Association and the affiliated tutoring program Goals while at W-L. As a member she was able to celebrate her Bolivian heritage through her folkloric dance skills and also support the Hispanic community and heritage within the Arlington community. She was a participant in George Mason’s Early Identification Program and volunteered at INOVA Fairfax twice a week. Stephanie is currently pursuing a pre-med track at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.



Shaelyn Dempsey

was a member of the National Honor Society, a frequent recipient of the Student of the Semester award, and a Scholastic Art Award Silver Key winner while at W-L. She was also an Amigo Ambassador in Ecuador, which furthered her desire to make cross-cultural connections with others. Natalie is a junior majoring in applied computer science at George Mason University. She is the chair of the Society of Professional Hispanic Engineers and organized the chapter's community outreach events. As a STEM research intern for Edu-Futuro, a leadership development non-profit for low-income students, she built an online coding curriculum for middle school students.

Mission

The primary mission of the W-L Education Foundation is to provide criteria-based college scholarships to W-L graduates exclusively. Each initial scholarship is for \$1,500. Students who are awarded a scholarship can reapply at the completion of each undergraduate college year for \$1,000 renewal scholarships, with the potential of receiving up to \$4,500 over four years. Initial scholarships and renewals are competitive. The number of scholarships awarded each year is contingent upon the funds received through the Annual Giving Campaign.

A secondary mission of the Foundation is to provide a small number of professional development fellowships to faculty members on continuing contract. The Foundation board recognizes that assisting W-L's staff through extended professional learning opportunities and experiences can directly enhance educational growth, and thus enrich instruction for all students at the school.
