Message from the President

Phil Krauth, President & Faculty Member

In order to reduce our printing and mailing expenses, the W-L Education Foundation will mail future bulletins starting in March 2025 **only** to donors from whom we have received a financial contribution in the past three years.

The W-L Ed. Foundation was started more than 20 years ago with a single primary purpose, to provide scholarships to deserving W-L graduates to help them with the expenses of higher education. Since 2002, the Foundation has mailed an annual bulletin to thousands of W-L alumni in order to inform them of the Foundation's and the scholarship recipients' activities, and to encourage those alums to enable

the Foundation's work by making a financial contribution. At the same time, the Bulletin provided a link for alumni memories among the 14,000 recipients, literally around the world.

This past fall, the Board of the Foundation made a difficult but, we think, financially prudent decision to continue producing an annual bulletin in the late winter each year, but to mail it only to W-L alumni whom we have heard from and have received a contribution from in recent years. We made this decision for two reasons: (1) it is difficult to keep such a large mailing list up to date, and we realize that, as people move, many of the bulletins do not reach their intended recipients, and (2) the generous alums who support the Foundation's work with donations represent less than 2% of the people on our mailing list. Printing and mailing costs have continued to rise, and thus the expense of sending the bulletin to everyone on our mailing list has begun to take away from the Foundation's primary mission, to fund scholarships for college students.

The Board desired to cut its printing and mailing costs without cutting into the money that the Foundation raises each year through its appeals in the annual bulletin. We believe that we can do that by continuing to produce and mail an informative bulletin for the hundreds of W-L alumni whom we have heard from and received a contribution from recently, rather than to the thousands on our mailing list, of whom many have chosen not to contribute to the

Foundation over the years.

The Board hopes that this action, to trim our printing and mailing costs, will have several positive outcomes. It will allow us to dedicate a larger percentage of your donations to students. It will minimize the environmental impact of unread paper copies. It should encourage more readers to make a contribution next year to guarantee their own mailed copy.

This is therefore the last annual bulletin that the Foundation will mail to all 14,000 people on our mailing list. If it is not possible for you to make a financial contribution to the Foundation at this time, but you still want to stay connected to the W-L Education Foundation and its scholarship recipients, we will gladly send an electronic version of the annual bulletin to you starting in March 2025 if you email that request to us at wlhsfoundation@gmail.com.

Along with the change in our bulletin policy, the Foundation has seen two additions this year in its Board of Directors. We welcome new Board members Margaret Feinstein and Erik Van de Meulebroecke. Margaret offered financial advice in last year's reinvestment of our annuity fund and will continue to lend her financial expertise as a Board member. Erik, a parent of W-L graduates, comes to us with a background in web design and technology. We look forward to working with both of them and benefiting from their perspective, talent, and skills.

Mission

The primary mission of the W-L Education Foundation is to provide criteria-based college scholarships exclusively to W-L graduates. Each initial scholarship is for \$1,500. Students who are awarded a scholarship can reapply at the completion of each undergraduate college year for \$1,000 renewal scholarships, with the potential of receiving up to \$4,500 over four years. Initial scholarships and renewals are competitive. The number of scholarships awarded each year is contingent upon the funds received through the Annual Giving Campaign.

A secondary mission of the Foundation is to provide professional development fellowships to faculty members on continuing contract. The Foundation board recognizes that assisting W-L's staff through extended professional learning opportunities and experiences can directly enhance educational growth, and thus enrich instruction for all students at the school.

Scholarship Recipients from the Class of 2023

Generous donations from supporters enabled the Foundation to award 12 \$1,500 scholarships to graduating W-L seniors. Their impressive academic and co-curricular achievements from high school, as well as their current college status, are summarized below.

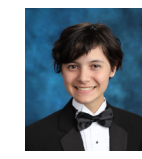
Marlena Gutshall

Lucy Miller

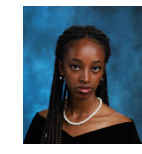

and she received the Principal's Award. Lucy attends the University of Virginia where she is working toward a degree in biochemistry.



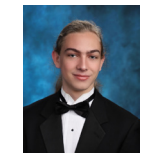
Kritika Rai
